Most of the CCTV is now up and running in Hythe. The CCTV has already helped us with our investigation into damage caused to Christmas lights in the High Street. A person has been reported for summons.

The residents in Brinton Lane in Hythe are continually being targeted by local youths where their doors are being knocked on. This is a regular occurrence and it is starting to constitute harassment. A warning to those youths involved, you are now being watched on Hythe's CCTV and any youth caught will be dealt with robustly!

Everyone can do their bit to ensure that others are not affected by this. Please do not park in front of other peoples driveways or block their driveways in any way.
